Recent Events:

AGM

The meeting was opened by our President delivering an entertaining account of the attendance of Penelope, Edward and Monique Pottage at the centennial commemoration of the end of the first world war in Brunoy which was of course reported in the last Newsletter.

Anne Miller then brought us up to date on matters Brunoy, especially the very successful 25th Twinning Anniversary celebrations both in Brunoy and Reigate, thanking everyone for the enormous effort which went into the organisation, resulting a most memorable programme. Anne also mentioned the April trip to Brunoy which will include a visit to the château de Rambouillet (where de Gaulle said "Non" to Harold Macmillan).

Moving on to the Eschweiler link, Janet Powell reviewed the visit to Eschweiler last year and the carnival celebrations which have taken place since. It was encouraging to hear about the continuing exchange links between the Priory School and the Barbaraschule. Arrangements for the forthcoming visit from Eschweiler are well in hand, although Brexit uncertainty is already causing travel problems for the Eschweiler delegation. We were reminded that the barbecue on the Saturday night at Redhill and Reigate Golf Clubhouse was open to all members. Janet went on to mention her liaison with Angie Potter organiser of the Meet-up for languages initiative (a flyer was sent out with the last Newsletter) and concluded with an appeal for support from members for our hard working committee, many of whom are now doubling up on their roles.

Robert Bogin presented the treasurer's report which showed the finances of the organisation in good shape. The report was unanimously accepted as was the proposal to request Andrew Lewis to continue in his role as auditor. Robert went on to review the membership which currently stands at 92 including a number of honorary members. The paying membership is 73 but 7 of these have not yet renewed their subscriptions. However these totals include group and family membership, so the actual number of members is considerably higher.

The next item on the agenda was the election of the committee members. We are extremely fortunate that the team is largely unchanged except that some members are now taking on more than one role. Penelope will remain as our President, Robert Bogin is willing to remain Treasurer combining this with the role of membership secretary. Tammy Meduna-Scott is resigning as minutes secretary as she is embarking on an MBA course. Appreciation was shown by the meeting for Tammy's contribution over the past few years. Sally Baker is continuing as Secretary. Anne Miller will support rather than lead the Brunoy link and Monique Pottage will take over the lead role. Janet and Graham Powell will continue in their current capacities as head of the Eschweiler link and publicity and carnival respectively. Finally a very welcome addition to the committee are Ros Borkowski and Rosemary Jones.

AOB led to a discussion about future events. There was a broad consensus that the current programme satisfied most of the needs of the current membership. The main problem facing the organisers was the diminishing supply of premises suitable for accommodating events and the high cost of meals.

The meeting concluded in a convivial manner with a feast of cheese and wine, organised by Monique and Sally, and, Graham and Janet.
